DATA HIGHLIGHTS

As of May 19, 2016

In Zimbabwe:

- More than **7,800** households have participated in ZIMPHIA
- More than 20,000 individuals, including over 4,800 children and adolescents ages 0-14, have received HIV counseling and testing

In Malawi:

- More than 8,300 households have participated in MPHIA
- More than 16,000 individuals, including over 4,000 children and adolescents ages 0-14, have received HIV counseling and testing

Supplies on Demand: Coordinating Logistics for the Multi-Country PHIA Project

PHIA survey teams are conducting thousands of interviews and HIV tests as they travel throughout Zimbabwe,



Malawi, and Zambia in 4x4 trucks loaded with supplies. Every single item the teams use, from butterfly needles and vacutainer tubes to clipboards and pens, has arrived in their hands through months of meticulously planned procurement, transport, and inventory management. PROJECT UPDATES

Zimbabwe

 Partnered with ZIMSTAT, the national statistics agency, to conduct spot checks and quality assurance of household identification, household entry, consent and data collection procedures

Malawi

 Expanded community mobilization efforts to include local radio spots and traditional dance and drama performances

Zambia

- Completed data collection in Western and Northern Provinces
- Trained an additional 20 survey teams for phase-two deployment

Uganda

- Began household listing of 523 enumeration areas nationwide
- Began recruiting field staff including nurses, clinical officers, laboratory technicians, interviewers
- First series of lab and interviewer trainings to begin in late May

Tanzania

- Household listing to be completed by the end of May
- Preliminary laboratory training to be conducted in late May

Swaziland

• Completed listing of all households in 289

enumeration areas

 Training of over 250 staff in laboratory and/or field survey procedures to begin in June

Lesotho

- Survey received endorsement of Queen 'Masenate Mohato Seeiso
- Trainings to start in July
