DATA HIGHLIGHTS as of August 16, 2016

In Zimbabwe:

- More than **15,000** households have participated in ZIMPHIA
- More than **30,000** individuals, including over **7,100** children and adolescents age 14 and under, have received HIV counseling and testing
- Fieldwork is complete

In Malawi:

- More than **14,000** households have participated in MPHIA
- More than **23,000** individuals, including over **6,100** children and adolescents age 14 and under, have received HIV counseling and testing

In Zambia:

- More than **10,700** households have participated in ZAMPHIA
- More than **27,000** individuals, including over **7,800** children and adoles cents age 14 and under, have received HIV counseling and testing

PROJECT UPDATES

Zimbabwe

- Fieldwork is complete
- ZIMPHIA has recruited over 30,000 participants exceeding the target sample size of 28,000
- Data cleaning and analysis are underway

Malawi

- Field teams have surveyed all selected EAs
- Field teams will spend the remainder of August resolving final outcomes for outstanding households and revisiting urban households to improve the male sample in urban areas
- Fieldwork will be completed in the last week of August

Zambia

• Fieldwork is scheduled to be complete by the end of August

Uganda

- 28 survey teams will begin data collection in the last week of August
- Official Launch Ceremony will be held on August 23

Tanzania

- Laboratory training of more than 200 nurseinterviewers is complete
- Interviewer training is currently underway
- Fieldwork is scheduled to start in September

Swaziland

- Training has been completed for over 150 field staff in interview procedures, use of tablets for data collection, and home-based HIV testing and counseling
- Training has been completed for laboratory technicians in conducting viral load testing and early infant diagnosis
- Fieldwork is scheduled to begin in August

Lesotho

- Nurse interviewers are being selected; training is scheduled to start in August
- Fieldwork is scheduled to start in November
